I have a friend who likes to coin new words. One he spent several years arguing with me about is the word "calendarize." Though it isn't a word, we could probably do some calendarizing here. The season of Advent is upon us! It's a time of anticipation, of longing, of pleading with our Lord and Savior to come and save us. Advent begins on the Sunday that is closest to November 30. So this year, it starts on Sunday the 29th. The season then runs through December 24.

During the time of Advent, our Scripture readings are focused on the need for Christ to come, both in the first coming in Bethlehem, and in the second coming, when everyone will see him. In many churches, and many homes as well, during their family devotions, an advent wreath is used. This is a pretty recent tradition, first done in the 1830s. On the first Sunday a candle representing hope will be lit. The second Sunday introduces a candle representing faith. Both of these candles are purple, symbolizing royalty and preparation. The third Sunday uses a rose colored candle signifying joy. On the fourth Sunday we add a purple candle symbolizing peace. On Christmas Day, the finish line, the white Christ candle, representing purity, is lit. At that time, the season changes from Advent, with its blue or violet color scheme, to Christmas, which is all dressed in white.

As we continue calendarizing, the other season that begins in December is . . . Christmas! It *begins* in December, but includes twelve days, running through January 5.

Many churches and cultures have ended the season with an elaborate Twelfth Night celebration. During the season of Christmas, there are a number of other holidays. We've observed some "Saint's Days" in the past months, when one has come on a Sunday. These are days when the Church has traditionally remembered something that they think happened on that date. For an individual, it is normally the date that person died and received his eternal inheritance.

What are those holidays within the season of Christmas? We remember St. Stephen from the book of Acts on December 26. We remember John the Evangelist on December 27. We remember the Holy Innocents, who were killed by Herod's forces looking for Jesus on December 28. We remember the Circumcision and Naming of Jesus on January 1. We then move to the day and season of Epiphany starting on January 6. When people called the end of December "the holidays" that was some of what they were talking about.

I pray that we would remember Jesus throughout this holiday season. That during Advent we would be eagerly praying that he would come and set things right. That during Christmas we would be rejoicing that he has come to save us. The Christian life has a rhythm and a calendar all its own. Recognizing it is a powerful testimony to our world. Why did we set aside extra time for extra church services? Because the season is real!


Children's Church

My Faith Story by Jacki Stelzer

When I was a little girl, I went to church just on Easter. My mother made my sisters and me new Easter dresses every year, complete with the hat, gloves, and new shoes. What a great feeling that was to go to church with my grandparents and get so many compliments on my new clothes. Although I didn't really catch the real reason I was at church, I knew that it was a great place to feel good; a place to get my spirits lifted.

You can say that my grandparents planted the mustard seed. As I grew a little older, I attended Friendship Baptist Church in Mexico with them, the few times I went. I also visited First Baptist, in Centralia, with my friends occasionally.

Through my teenage years I fell far away from God. Feeling depressed and hating myself I knew there was something missing in my life. For years I didn't understand. Yes, I knew God was there, but I ignored Him.

It wasn't until I got married and had a child that I decided that I wanted a better life for my child. I started taking my son to church and almost immediately I got that same feeling as when I was younger. But something was different. I found my heart was fuller. Burden was lifted from my shoulders. It was the acceptance of God and He was working on me. What a peaceful feeling. It took me a few Sundays to get the nerve to "go forward", as Baptists do. I remember the day I finally did. I'm sure it was the Holy Spirit that threw the hymnal out of my hands and onto the pew because it went down with a bang. It startled the people in front of me. I was finally baptized when I was 22.

After I had my second child, I fell away from God again. My husband and I got a divorce and after a short while I married Russell. It wasn't until I had my third child that we had this great conversation with Rev Don McMurry, Pastor of First Baptist Church. You see, Russell was a Lutheran and I was a Baptist. We had talked about going to church and wanted to go together but didn't know where to go. So, we just didn't. Rev. McMurry came to visit us at home one day and I told him of our struggle. His unselfish words made all the difference in the world to us. He said, "The bible says that the man is the head of the household. You, Jacki, need to follow Russell." Well that was a little hard for me to swallow. But it was an answer and that's what we did. I followed him to Good Shepherd and was confirmed a short time later. As you may know we have been here since. We raised our children in the church. They too have had their struggles but I am thankful they have joined their own churches.

And now I have eight wonderful grandchildren. My hope is that I can influence them the way that my grandparents influenced me because they were great examples of God's love.

God has blessed me in so many ways through my life. Even when I didn't recognize His works, He was certainly there. My heart is full, my burdens are less. I know now that when I feel troubled, all I have to do is go to our Lord and put the burden on Him. He will handle the rest.

Now I am learning to share God's love with others in a way that I have never done before. Sure, I've talked about God and how He loves me and others. But to intentionally approach someone to share the Gospel is what I'm growing in my faith to do. I'm a work in progress.

I would like to share with you the most beautiful story I have ever lived. I am happy to share it along with mine because my mother is not able to share.

Mary Crump, lived a life of kindness and charity. She would give to anyone that needed a hand. Although she was a very giving person, she was not a Christian.

Mom had a medical procedure done right after Christmas 2014. She had complications from that procedure and spent the next three weeks in ICU. During Mom's hospital stay, Brother Clyde Chiles, from First Baptist, visited her one day and shared a special prayer with her. I was not present during this visit, so I did not know of the prayer. Clyde called me to tell me of Mom's profession of faith. We rejoiced together.

Mom must have been lying in her bed thinking about her life. I can imagine her thinking that she just cemented her relationship with her Lord through her profession of faith that she had just made. She understood there is only one way to Heaven and that is to believe that Jesus is our Lord and Savior.

The next day, as I was sitting with Mom in her hospital room, she motioned to me to come to her bedside. She asked me about the prayer that Clyde had prayed. I didn't know what she was talking about. I called Clyde and he immediately knew. He dictated it to me over the phone. Mom and I prayed that prayer together. We had never prayed together, and it was a great feeling to have that moment. That was the first time I had told her I was proud of her.

Later that evening, Mom requested to be baptized as soon as possible. We were in a dilemma because we knew that Baptists baptize by dunking and Mom was hooked up to oxygen and other machines. One pastor wouldn't baptize her because it wasn't possible. Wanting to fulfill Mom's wishes, we finally found the Baptist Hospital Chaplain. He explained to us that when a woman is giving birth and can't naturally, God allows us to make an alternate solution to save the mother and baby. He viewed baptism the same way. He couldn't dunk, but he would sprinkle. We set the baptism up for the next day. With family members present at her bedside she was baptized. We could tell that it meant so much to her. About four hours later the Lord called her Home.

The Lord was working through so many people in the last few days and moments of her life. I can't think of anything more beautiful.
