We've been walking through the different seasons of the Church year in recent months. Most of the seasons are relatively short. We saw Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and then the quick succession of Ascension, Pentecost Sunday, and Trinity Sunday.

Now it's time to settle in for the long season of the Church year, the one with too many names. Most often it's called the season of Pentecost, though sometimes it is called the season of Trinity, since Trinity Sunday is at the start. In a less inspired manner, some church bodies refer to it as "ordinary time."

This season begins with Trinity Sunday, which this year is May 30. It then walks through the life of the body of Christ, bit by bit, starting with the idea of new life and continuing to the hope of the second coming of Christ as we approach the end of the season. The conclusion is the last Sunday in the Church year, the fifth Sunday before Christmas, which is that Sunday closest to the commemoration of St. Andrew, November 30.

In this season, which lasts approximately six months, we need to ask ourselves how we are going to walk our way through the Christian life. Do we dedicate ourselves, as did the earliest Christians, to the apostolic doctrine, to the public reading and explanation of Scripture, to prayers in community with others, and to bringing the news of Jesus' perfect life, death, burial, and resurrection to rescue sinful humanity from our sin? Do we try to recognize the work of Christ in all of life? Do we try to live as his hands reaching to our world, drawing people to him through his reconciling love which breaks down the barrier our sin has erected between us and God?

Town Hall Meeting April 25, 2021 Seven Models of Shared Ministry for Mission Rev. Bill Geis

Pastor Geis has 31 years experience as a pastor. He encouraged the audience to share thoughts and questions during his presentation. His introduction noted Matthew 9:35-38 summed up as, "The harvest is plentiful, the laborers few." He pointed out that a response to this scripture may be:

- Keep doing what we are doing.
- Try harder
- Give up?

He related an example of a church he served in Lone Wolf, Oklahoma that were ready to give up, but they did not; and now they are ready to make one of their own their next pastor.

Pastor Geis went on to explain the Luke 10:2 adds to this scripture: "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." He stated an analogy of wheat:

- Harvest too early and the crop molds
- Harvest to late and you may lose the crop

He cited an example from his experience in Chicago; whereas there were once 50 congregations with over 62,000 members, now 15 years later that same area is down to 5,000 members.

Pastor Geis proceeded to give us example of seven models of shared ministry. A working definition of shared ministry is

- Congregations coming together
- as stewards
- exercising their gifts [of the body of Christ] God will give the church every gift that is needed.
- with a clear vision (when you ask people to volunteer tell them what they will need to do, give them the resources they will need, give them an exit strategy of when their job ends)
- for mission and ministry

Pastor Geis pointed out that the word pastor is not in this definition. Shared Ministry is mission focused. If the pastor is the sole point of sharing, then the ministry is neither effective nor healthy.

Six Shifts in Thinking (to move from dual-parish mentality to shared ministry mentality)

- 1. Shift from working alone to working collaboratively (work with synod)
- 2. Survival strategies of scarcity to stewardship strategies of God's abundant resources
- 3. Money constraints to mission opportunities (money follows mission)
- 4. Mere pulpit supply to more people development (avoid focus on the core activity rather than the mission)
- 5. Protecting identity to exercising identity with purpose (example: concern that the other church will take our youth over to their youth group)
- 6. Congregational focus to multiplying movements for the Kingdom of God (Jesus work in the kingdom is like multiplication, growth exponentially, most church planting today is done by small churches)

What is one insight we've gained from presentation so far:

- Stewardship is not just about money
- How much you can pay a pastor isn't what it's all about.
- Don't need to worry about losing the identity of our church

Our Mission Field

Imagine a figure 8 motion—a balance of Gathering and Sending

BRAINSTORM

What opportunities do we have to multiply ministry regionally?

Many of our people drive Route B to work every day—reach out to those who travel and are along that route.

Example: Leadership Academy (Seniors work with At-risk 3rd,4th,5th students once a week in the area schools)

Some questions asked at the Town Hall Meeting:

1. A "Soon to be graduate"...how can we get him on our call list.

Answer: There is a program at Sem to put seminary students in rural churches on weekends

2. When it comes to partner with another church, are we better off looking up for a bigger church or similar church. Answer: Two different size churches may work best. Although any two churches could try out an experiment of hosting a big event together, etc. (think of the analogy of two friends playing in the sand box before they develop a long friendship) Advice that if we were to share a pastor with dual parish then hire another minister 0.25 time to assist.

The Town Hall meeting with Pastor Geis was recorded. If you want to watch that then let Gary and Ann Seider or one of the elders know. It is stored on an SD card. Most computers have an SD slot or Ann can arrange to show it to you at church on her computer.



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
